Please fill out this form to initiate your Virginia criminal records search. The processing of arrest warrant-related matters in Washington County, VA, is handled by the court services division of the local sheriff's office. This department prepares the necessary documentation for active warrants and contacts witnesses when required in pre-warrant hearings. Once a signed active warrant is issued, it's sent to the detectives and other members of the sheriff's team for execution. Although a warrant may remain unserved, the court services section retains responsibility for filing it under the outstanding warrants category. However, civilians seeking a warrant search or information about arrest records must contact the public services section or the records division. To reach the clerk from these sections, visit the sheriff's office at 20281 Rustic Lane, Abingdon, Virginia 24210 and check out the list of Washington County's most wanted. Other state divisions that offer information on arrest records and active warrants include: The magistrate's office and the county clerk's department. A small fee is charged for printing costs and accessing data from state-maintained repositories. To request information from judicial offices, you can also access details on civil litigation against the subject. Can a simple phone call provide details on Washington County arrests and warrants? For arrest records and offense reports, call the Sheriff's Office at 276-676-6000. For recent arrests, call the Abingdon Facility of the Southwest Virginia Regional Jail at (276)739-3520. For criminal case investigation details (for victims only), call the Investigation Division of the Sheriff's Office at 276-676-6021. For a warrant search involving misdemeanor offenses, contact the District Clerk at 276-676-6279 or 276-676-6281. For juvenile delinquency matters, call the District Court JDR clerk at 276-676-6282. For judicial records of felony cases, contact the Office of the Circuit Clerk at 276/676-6224 or 276/676-6226. Crime statistics in Washington County, Virginia reveal that in 2019, 600 out of 640 criminal complaints handled by the Sheriff's Office were property crimes, while around 40 were violent crimes. Larceny thefts accounted for the highest number of cases in terms of property crimes, with an annual average of over 450 occurrences. In the violent crimes category, aggravated assault cases had the highest frequency, with an incident rate of 20 cases/annum. The police in Washington County, VA, have received nearly 1200 crime reports annually over the eight-year period from 2001 to 2008, and there has been a significant increase of over 70% in the averages of violent and total crime throughout this period. Virginia's law enforcement agencies are required to make warrants publicly available, as per the Virginia Public Records Act. This means that citizens can access and view warrant records, which include personal identifying characteristics such as name, date of birth, mugshot, charges, height, weight, hair and eye color, last known address, age, sex, race, and issue date. However, there are restrictions on accessing certain types of warrant records, like those issued for juveniles or containing information that might affect ongoing investigations. There are different types of warrants available in Virginia, including: \* Search warrant: A legal document authorizing a law enforcement officer to conduct a search based on probable cause. \* Arrest warrant: An order to arrest an individual when there is sufficient proof of criminal involvement. \* Inspection warrant: A written order commanding the entry and inspection of property or premises. \* Bench warrant: An order issued when a person refuses to appear in court. Search warrants, in particular, are issued for the search and seizure of specific items related to criminal activity. In Virginia, law enforcement must get a search warrant before searching for evidence related to a crime. They do this by filing an affidavit with a judge or magistrate, which includes details about what they're looking for and why they think it's connected to the crime. This process typically takes just a few hours or days, depending on how quickly the information can be verified and the judge can review it. Search warrants usually specify where and what will be searched, as well as who is authorized to carry out the search. Before searching, law enforcement must give a copy of the warrant and the affidavit to the owner of the property or premises being searched. Law enforcement in Virginia can also get an arrest warrant if they have reason to believe someone has committed a crime. This type of warrant authorizes them to apprehend and bring the person before a court. An arrest warrant typically includes information about the accused, the charge against them, and instructions for their arrest and appearance in court. When it comes to executing search or arrest warrants, law enforcement officers must follow specific procedures. They are required to give notice of the warrant's issuance to the accused and inform them of the time and place of its execution. The officer may also choose to notify other law enforcement agencies from jurisdictions where the crime was committed if the accused is arrested outside their local jurisdiction. After executing a warrant, the officer must endorse the date on the document and return it to a judicial official for further action. Before appearing before a judge in a county or city, the accused is expected to undergo a bail hearing. The judge will decide whether to release the person on bail or send them to jail for transfer to the locality where they will be tried. In Virginia, law enforcement agencies are responsible for holding arrest warrants. As such, individuals can conduct an arrest warrant lookup at the issuing or executing agency's office. Typically, requesters can find arrest warrants at the following locations: \* City or County Police Departments: Individuals can search online or in person at City or County Police Departments. Online searchers should note that warrant information may be listed under headings like "Most Wanted," Warrant list, or Active Outstanding Warrants. \* County Sheriff's Office: The most common method of conducting an arrest warrant lookup is online. Many offices publish the names of wanted persons on their websites to ensure public safety. \* Circuit Courts: Individuals can visit their city or circuit court in person to request their arrest warrants. All visits must be made during regular business hours, and an ID may be required. \* Virginia Department of Corrections (VDOC): Individuals can find arrest warrant information online on the VDOC website. To determine if an arrest warrant has been issued in one's name, individuals can visit the nearest police precinct or Sheriff's Office to make inquiries. Most law enforcement agencies have warrant lists on their websites, where individuals can find warrants issued in their names. For example, Chesterfield County residents can view Active Warrants on the Police Department's website. Record seekers can conduct free warrant searches online in Virginia. Many law enforcement agencies have warrant lists on their websites that can be used to view warrant information for free. Individuals seeking records can view active warrants in custody at no cost through the department. To find out if someone has a warrant online, visit the city or county police department or sheriff's office website, which often publishes warrant lists that can be searched by last name. For instance, Roanoke County Police Department's Outstanding Warrant List and Goochland County Sheriff's Office's Most Wanted list provide such information. Third-party online portals also offer warrant searches using first name, last name, and state criteria, with possible additional requirements to narrow the search; a small fee may apply. In Virginia, warrants have varying durations based on type; all unexecuted warrants expire in the state. Search warrants must be executed within 15 days of issuance (VA Code § 19.2-56), while inspection warrants are valid for ten days unless renewed or extended by the issuing judge (VA Code § 19.2-395).
